### Wood Stoves in winter

Get your chimney cleaned out to reduce creosote and danger of a chimney fire. Do not burn household trash. This can add to the creosote which adds to the danger of stove pipe and chimney fires. Ashes stay hot for a very, very long time so be careful where you discard them.

# Dangers of feeding Wildlife

Feeding mule deer dry corn expands in their stomach and can lead to death. Also, feeding them attracts not only deer but their main predator, the mountain lion, right to your yard. A mountain lion in your yard equals danger to your pets and children. Keep your pets out of the food-chain. Because of this, feeding deer is illegal and you can be fined by the Division of Wildlife. Bears and dogs love trashcans. They knock them over, then the trash blows all over the street. Put trash out the morning of pickup or order a bear-proof can from Mountain View Waste.

# Covenants protect your property value

Your home is one of the <u>largest investments</u> you make. Don't trash your investment. Trashed homes or junk cars reduce your property value by \$1000s of dollars and depress your neighbors' property value too. When you sell you will net less money for your home in your pocket. Cleaning up just the month before you sell won't help you. Depressed home prices around you can continue up to a year or more. When your home is a salvage yard or junk yard you are in violation not only of the Covenants but also Park County Land Use Regulations (LURs). Covenants and LURs apply whether you join the HOA or not. The covenants are recorded with Park County and your title company supplied you with the Covenants when you bought the property. **Protect your property investment.** <u>It's one of the largest investments you make.</u>

### **Do you rent out your home?** Regarding your renters (long-term renters, VRBO & Airbnb)

Park County regulations cover **you and your renters.** You are ultimately responsible if your renter breaks the law. The mountains have rules that renters may not be aware of if they are from the city. Inform them of these rules when you rent to them for your safety and for the safety of your neighbors.

This checklist is to add to your **<u>Renters Bulletin Board or Policy Book</u>**. Critical items are:

#### Fire Bans:

Confirm when Fire Bans are in effect by checking www. http:// plattecanyonfire.com/burn-buildingpermits/ or calling the Park County Fire Ban Information Line at 719-836-4160. Fire Pits require a permit. Burn Permits are issued free of charge and only need to be obtained once in the life time of a residency. Pick them up in person at Station 2, 153 Dellwood Drive, Bailey during business hours.

Fires are a constant threat in the mountains. Fire starts can be by cigarettes, by fire pits left unattended without being extinguished and by lightning. 3 more ways for you to learn there is a Fire Ban:

- 1) Code Red. Register at <u>www.onsolve.com</u> or call 855-850-1476
- 2) Burn bans are posted on electronic signs along Hwy 285
- 3) Smoky the Bear Burn Ban sign at base of Lone Rock (Hwy 285 near Roland Rd)

#### Dogs:

Must be in yard or under your control. They cannot roam the neighborhood & in particular, **they** cannot harass or harm wildlife. You can get warnings or fines from Animal Control 719-836-4380.

#### **Barking Dogs:**

It is understandable when dogs bark for short periods of time. After 20 minutes of barking, neighbors will notify Animal Control. If you do not control your pets, you may receive fines. See FAQ barking dogs.

#### Firearms:

Contact Park County Sheriff for requirements & limitations at 719-836-4121 option 5. Bullets cannot leave the property & must have a backdrop. Noise ordinances apply after 10 pm & before 8 am.

#### Noise:

Park County Regulations limit noise after 10pm and before 8 am.

#### Water:

The State of Colorado sets water use rules. Most all wells in Burland are House-hold use only (inside). Contact Colo Division of Water Resources <u>http://water.state.co.us</u> or call 303-866-3581 for more info.

#### Septic:

Avoid poisonous substances that could leach into the ground water and contaminate neighboring wells. Excessive foodstuff down the drain disposal could clog up your own system and cost you money.

#### **Fire Evacuation:**

In the event of a fire, plan to evacuate quickly and safely. Plan where you will meet family and friends.

#### Illegal marijuana grows or drug labs:

Will be reported to the Sheriff. A recent lab explosion & fire has everyone watching out for their safety.

#### Trash:

Put out the morning of trash pick-up, not the night before. Bears, mountain lions and dogs will be attracted to your house and spread trash all over road.
